Christian worship joyfully ascribes all praise and honor, glory and power to the triune God [God the Father, God the Son (Jesus Christ), and God the Holy Spirit]. In worship the people of God

Psalm 95:1-7

O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods. In his hand are the depths of the earth; the heights of the mountains are his also. The sea is his, for he made it, and the dry land, which his hands have formed.

O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord. our Maker! For he is our God, and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand.

acknowledge God present in the world and in their lives. As they respond to God's claim and redemptive action in Jesus Christ, believers are transformed and renewed. In worship the faithful offer themselves to God and are equipped for God's service in the world. - Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA)

Put another way: we give our whole lives over to the whole God and recognize and celebrate the presence of God in our whole lives. respond to what Jesus Christ has done for us and for the world and know that our lives have radically changed because of the person and work of Jesus Christ. We offer ourselves in service to God.

All of that is definitely true and yet we fall short of getting it right. While we don't often like to proclaim that we don't do things right in our lives we actually are called to come worship God out of admitting that we don't get it right! We come to worship because we know that God does get it right and we praise him for welcoming us into his presence. Jesus Christ takes our efforts at worship and turns it into glorious praise before God the Father - our worship is holy and pleasing before God.

We come to worship to be transformed and celebrate transformation. In Jesus Christ, we know that we have a new life. We aren't stuck in our old habits and our old ways of thinking. We don't have to play by the same depressing rules. We are freed to have our joy in Christ! When we come together to praise God or to be in the presence of others praising God, we are opening ourselves up to the Holy Spirit working in our lives - we are being opened to letting our old identity go and being given a new identity in Christ.

We do this in old and new ways. There are hymns and spiritual songs contained in the Bible. Interestingly, the words are often closer to what we consider hymns today, but the instruments and way they would have been sung are closer to what we consider praise songs today. Some of us connect with formality, some of us connect with casualness. Whatever style of worship God is calling you to engage in (probably all of them!), we want to welcome you and know that you have a spiritual home in our communal worship.

In all of our worship we seek to be focused on Christ and His Word and organize our worship on what is commanded of us in Scripture!



Why Do We Do That In Worship?

In this section, we will try to briefly shed some light on why we do what we do in our times of communal worship. All of our times of worship include something along these lines. You'll notice that a theme throughout is that we do these things because we find God's call to do them in the Bible.

Call to Worship Our call to worship is a summons from God to come and worship Him. We are called and reminded to be faithful to the call we have to give all glory to God the Father through Jesus Christ. We use passages directly from or inspired by the Bible.

Singing and Music Whether hymns or praise songs or whatever you like to call them, we sing so that we can make melody to the ears of God. Music and singing are very expressive forms of communication that we have been given to express all manners of praise - through joy and through sorrow. We are told in Ephesians 5:19-20 to "be filled with the Spirit, as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." We encourage you to sing loudly and boldly and let it make a sweet sound to our God!

Prayer of Confession and Assurance of Pardon We confess our sins together that we may confess that Jesus is Lord and Savior and that we need his salvation. We take this time to unburden ourselves of the sin that weighs us down as a community and as individuals just as Jesus taught us in the Lord's Prayer. We are then assured that because of the work of Jesus Christ and through our faith in Him that all our sins are forgiven.

Sharing in the Peace of Christ This is a tangible way that we show that we are at peace with one another. We have God's peace through Jesus Christ and we extend this peace to others to show that we are united and that nothing stands between us.

Scripture Reading We read passages from both the Old and New Testaments because the whole Bible is God's Word written to us and for us and is useful so that we will know of God's love for and actions in the world, the salvation we have in Christ, and the presence of the Holy Spirit amongst us. 2 Timothy 3:16-17 tells us that, "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

Sermon We have the sermon so that the pastor can have a job. Not really. God calls us to proclaim the Word that all may believe because the Good News of Jesus Christ is *heard*. We mine the scriptures so that we may be transformed by and live our lives according to the Living Word Jesus Christ.

Offering The offering is a time to live into the commands of scripture to return what we have been blessed with to the Body of Christ - the Church. It is a time to commit our time, talent, and resources to living a Christ-centered life.

Prayers of the People We are called by God to be a people that are in regular communication with Him and we call this prayer. It is a time to adore God, thank God, and ask that God be active in particular situations in our world and in our lives. We invited you to verbally lift up a prayer to God that our whole community might join you in that prayer - the heart behind the prayer is more important than the words!



Who is That Guy?

a short biography of Pastor Seth Normington

Pastor Seth was born and raised in Spokane, Washington where the weather is nothing like the weather in Seattle. Both his mother's and father's families have a rich farming and ranching heritage but his grandparents were the ones in their families who found something else to do. He was baptized at a Presbyterian church that his mother joined the summer before he was born. He grew up playing every sport he could possibly play. He stopped going to church in fifth grade but things of faith were consistently on his mind.

In junior high and high school, Seth spent most of his time outside of school running cross country and track. In high school, he was at school by 6:30 in the morning to run and almost every day spent time after school running (he was thinner then). During his senior year his parents divorced. He was a captain on the 5th-ranked track team in the nation.

The summer before college, Seth felt called to take a deeper look at his faith but didn't know what to do about it besides reading his Bible. The day before classes started at Western Washington University, he went to the INN with a friend. There he found 600 college students praising God. He knew immediately this is where God was calling him. At the INN, he joined and led small groups, went on mission trips, wrote and performed in skits and videos, and spent a year working at the INN after graduating with a degree in human services.

Feeling called to ministry of some stripe, Seth was in youth ministry in Spokane while earning an MA in Religious Studies at Gonzaga University. He then moved to the San Francisco area to serve as youth director at the Presbyterian Church of Novato. During these years, he went to Tijuana, Mexico seven times to build houses and his heart was struck by the need for mission work and the depths of poverty in our world.

He went to Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey where he earned a Masters of Divinity degree and served people with developmental disabilities and led the educational ministry at a local church.

Pastor Seth has been the pastor at LPC since July 2010. He especially loves the opportunity to preach and teach God's Word, celebrate the sacraments, and teach and lead people to deeper discipleship in Christ.

In his off hours, Seth is the assistant coach for Linden High School boys cross country and boys and girls track and field. He also enjoys watching shows on Netflix, cooking, golfing, drinking coffee, reading several newspapers/websites each day, pretending to himself that he reads more books than he actually does, exercising, and watching baseball.

40 Days in the Word

background as we end our sermon series based on the confession

This sermon series, based off of a series done by Rick Warren at Saddleback Church, will help us learn and explore what it means to rely on the Word of God to drive our lives and define our relationship with the Triune God. Fortunately, the sermon titles give us a great outline of what we will cover:

February 22 - Why Can I Trust the Bible?

March 1 - How the Bible Changes Us

March 8 - Seeing What God Wants Me to See

March 15 - How to Study a Bible Passage

March 22 - Understanding the Meaning of a Text

We look forward to you joining us in worship for this special time of learning and transformation as we dig into God's Word and how to study it.

Building My Life Based on Scripture

Let's look at James 1:19-21:

Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, for man's anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires. Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you.

Quick to Listen and Slow to Speak: Is this not the first step in learning? I think the best way to really solidify knowledge is to talk about it or teach it to someone else, but first we must be receivers of knowledge. The best way to receive God's Word is by listening to the Bible read (whether we read it to ourselves or hear another read it). The Holy Spirit has a hard time moving in us if we are never able to quiet ourselves and have a constantly rambling internal monologue and are simply waiting for another to cease speaking so we can get in our next words. Building your life based on scripture requires the cultivation of a listening spirit. This doesn't mean you need to be silent all the time, but you need to grow in your ability to listen.

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Building My Life Based on Scripture

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Slow to become angry: Perhaps one of the great and overlooked spiritual disciplines of our time. Being quick to anger and to fight for your point seems to be becoming a hallmark of our American culture. Such a trait is not how we advance in building ourselves upon the Word. We don't listen when we are angry. We aren't open to movements of the Spirit when we are upset. When we are angry or overwrought we become defensive to everything from the outside. But calmness lowers the blood pressure and the mind pressure. Cultivate the ability to reflect before you react. Establish a habit to help you with this practice. Are you wanting to be angry? Perhaps you could pull out your Bible and dive in for a quick scripture session. Perhaps your first reaction should be to turn to God in prayer. The next part of the verse might help you to realize that your anger isn't the offering God is looking for nor the path to the plan God has for you:

Your anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires: Contrary to what we often see in Christian circles, getting "mad as hell and I'm not going to take it anymore" is not the apex of Christian virtues. There isn't even a whole lot of room for your perceived "righteous anger." You are not called to be a doormat, but that doesn't mean you are being called to rage on the people with whom you are in conflict.

Get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent: The Holy Spirit is seeking to plant God's Word firmly in your heart but that becomes more difficult if the soil of your heart is filled with weeds (see Matthew 13:1-23). Pray for God to get rid of the filth in your life and be diligent in resisting evil temptations. Anything that is evil is blocking our hearing of God's Word. This process is also accomplished as we study the Bible. The more we are in scripture, the more we know God's will, and the more God is able to conform us to the Word.

Humbly accept the word planted in you: You need to be ready to be and do what God's Word tells you to be and do. You need to humbly accept God's Word to you. It is important to recognize what it is in yourself that might be resisting what scripture is speaking to you. To be humble in this situation means to consciously put yourself below God's Word in the pecking order of your ego. Fortunately, we have seen four spiritual hearing aids to doing this: being quiet, being calm, being clean, and now we see that we need to be humble.

James 1:22-25: Do not merely listen to the Word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. Anyone who listens to the Word but does not do what it says is like a man who looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like! But the man who looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues to do this, not forgetting what he has heard, but doing it--he will be blessed in what he does.

This passage reminds us that we are to be active in doing what the Bible says (more on that in a minute) but also that we are to look at it with our eyes - looking intently into the perfect law that gives freedom. If you are always waiting for someone else to tell you what the Bible says and what you should do, you are hardly building your life on God's Word, you are hoping someone else will do it for you. God doesn't call your pastor (or anyone else) to build your life for you. God calls you to put your complete faith in the Triune God and let the Spirit transform you. Part of that transformation is looking (read: studying) at God's Word. (continued on the next page)

Building My Life Based on Scripture

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God is not calling us to glance at the Word like we might take a quick glance in the mirror in the middle of the day. We are called to gaze into the Word. To take a long, hard look at it.

Living a life based on God's Word means studying the Word with hands and mouth. Our weekly devotional based on the Sunday message is a great way to get your hands on scripture each day. There are always questions for reflection. You can take the next step and not only ponder the questions in your mind but write down your thoughts. Writing down our thoughts and the things we learn helps them become hard-wired in our mind allowing us to recall them quicker and more completely. Our adult education groups (Mondays at 7:00pm and Tuesdays at 10:30am) are great way to use our mouths to learn. As we said earlier, we solidify our own thinking when we talk about it and discuss with other what is going on in the passage and in our minds (iron sharpens iron!).

James 1:25: The man who looks intently into the perfect law ...and continues to do this, not forgetting what he has heard but doing it, he will be blessed in what he does.

Bible study is not an occasional sideline to the rest of life. James 1:25 instructs us to continue to study scripture. The next step is not forgetting it. Choosing to memorize certain verses might be of tremendous use (more on this in the future). And then we must do it. My elementary school soccer coach said (which you've heard me quote often): practice doesn't make perfect, practice makes permanent.

By doing what the Word says, we have it ingrained in our lives by our actions.

Matthew 7:24-27:

"Everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock. But everyone who hears these words of mine and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man who built his house on sand. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell with a great crash."

May you hear God's words and take action!

The Word and the Table Sermon Series

From Cas Wepener in Reformed Worship:

There are many boundaries around individuals and groups, some of which are more evident than others. Less than two decades ago, South Africa still had laws defining many of those lines or borders within society. These days, although the laws of apartheid are to be found only in history books, there are still many different boundaries segregating groups from each other in South Africa, as in all other societies around the globe. When these boundaries are no longer defined in terms of race, they are often made on the basis of other distinctions, such as income level or faith group.

Knowingly (and sometimes unknowingly), individuals and groups define and uphold these boundaries through their actions. Among the factors defining these boundaries most clearly are food and table customs. South African philosopher Martin Versfeld once commented, "Nothing is more indicative of what you are than your food and table customs." The table at which we dine is a symbol of the society we live in. Therefore, by closely observing the table customs of different groups, and by watching how people act and interact around the table, we can learn about the boundaries of those groups.

During this seven week sermon series we will explore what Jesus and the disciples did around the tables they found themselves at in the Lukan narratives (the Gospel of Luke and Acts). How do we behave around the table? How does this translate into our outlook on life and how we treat others? We will dig into the Word of God (using our new skills and desire from the 40 Days in the Word series and look at how God is calling to us through these scriptures to transform our tables and our hearts.

Easter Sunday


Children International serves children by ensuring they receive (among other things):

Our deacons serve communion to those amongst us who are unable to join us for worship due to poor health or another concern. Amongst these and other ministries of the deacons there is something new! This spring you will notice that you will receive a phone call, a card, a face-to-face chat (or maybe all three!) with a deacon. The deacons are starting a "parish model" for their ministry. This means that everyone will have a deacon. We never want anyone who comes through our doors to feel like they are alone. You can always turn to the deacons for a listening ear, a strong shoulder, or to receive the resources you might need. So even if you come to worship every week, expect a deacon to reach out to you as the deacons seek to build personal, Christ-centered connections with each and every person. They will ask you how you are doing, a little about yourself, and how they can be praying for you. Our deacons want you to know that you are personally cared for all the time!

What is Stewardship of Time and Talent?

It is the wise and responsible use of the special gifts God has entrusted to each of us. It is believing that God has created each one of us with unique abilities and attributes—including our personalities, interests, motivations, life experiences, talents and skills, hopes and dreams—which make us who we are. We are one-of-a-kind creations of God with unique contributions to make in this world.

Why is this important?

Our lives have real meaning only when we use our gifts in accordance with God's will. As we grow in stewardship, we grow in our relationship with God. We grow in our ability to hear and accept God's call and to let our life be guided by God's will, not our own desires and impulses.

How can I be a good steward of my time and talents?

In short, put God at the center of your life. We are provided with many opportunities each day to be good stewards. We just need to be aware of the choices we make and the significance of our decisions.

Time...don't let it slip away!

No gift is greater than time, and yet, nothing is so easy to waste. Contrary to our cultural norms, good stewardship of time doesn't mean being busy all the time. Time spent in prayer, nurturing relationships with our family and friends or just enjoying the beauty of the world around us is time well spent. In fact, taking "time out" to nourish ourselves spiritually can be the best thing we can do to deepen our relationship with God.

Questions to Ponder

What Are My Talents?

We are often held back from recognizing or sharing our gifts because of a narrow definition of "talent." We think "talented people" are extraordinary achievers or have easily identifiable gifts, such as musical ability or artistic talent. We must remember that each one of us was created by God and was given the ability to serve God and each other in some way.

Talents include being a good listener, being able to organize people, relating well to children or teens, being patient with others and numerous other less recognized gifts. Our gifts often change during our lives: in our youth our gift may be energy; when we're older, it is knowledge. We are each one-of-a-kind creations of God with unique contributions to make in this world.

As Christians we recognize that our gifts of talents and skills are meant to be cultivated and shared with others, beginning with our family and friends, with our church community and with the world. Sharing the gift of ourselves is how we express our gratitude for being created as a unique and gifted people.

How can I be a good steward of my talents?

Begin by recognizing and acknowledging the talents you have been given. A first step in the process is gift discernment. When we regularly pray about our gifts and how God is calling us to use them, we are more likely to be fulfilled in our lives.

Practical ways to share your talents:

- ❖ Be available to your family and friends. Be open to the needs of those around you and be willing to provide assistance.
- ❖ Be an active member of your church. Your church is enriched and strengthened by the participation of its members.
- Get involved in your community. You touch and are touched by many people and groups who could benefit by your gifts—school, homeless shelter, nursing home, hospital, community center and others.
- Advocate for the things you believe in. Your voice can make a difference in your community, the nation and the world.

Our lives are God's gift to us; how we live is our gift to God.
