Christian worship joyfully ascribes all praise and honor, glory and power to the triune God [God the Father, God the Son (Jesus Christ), and God the Holy Spirit]. In worship the people of God

Psalm 95:1-7

O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods. In his hand are the depths of the earth; the heights of the mountains are his also. The sea is his, for he made it, and the dry land, which his hands have formed.

O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord. our Maker! For he is our God, and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand.

acknowledge God present in the world and in their lives. As they respond to God's claim and redemptive action in Jesus Christ, believers are transformed and renewed. In worship the faithful offer themselves to God and are equipped for God's service in the world. - Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA)

Put another way: we give our whole lives over to the whole God and recognize and celebrate the presence of God in our whole lives. respond to what Jesus Christ has done for us and for the world and know that our lives have radically changed because of the person and work of Jesus Christ. We offer ourselves in service to God.

All of that is definitely true and yet we fall short of getting it right. While we don't often like to proclaim that we don't do things right in our lives we actually are called to come worship God out of admitting that we don't get it right! We come to worship because we know that God does get it right and we praise him for welcoming us into his presence. Jesus Christ takes our efforts at worship and turns it into glorious praise before God the Father - our worship is holy and pleasing before God.

We come to worship to be transformed and celebrate transformation. In Jesus Christ, we know that we have a new life. We aren't stuck in our old habits and our old ways of thinking. We don't have to play by the same depressing rules. We are freed to have our joy in Christ! When we come together to praise God or to be in the presence of others praising God, we are opening ourselves up to the Holy Spirit working in our lives - we are being opened to letting our old identity go and being given a new identity in Christ.

We do this in old and new ways. There are hymns and spiritual songs contained in the Bible. Interestingly, the words are often closer to what we consider hymns today, but the instruments and way they would have been sung are closer to what we consider praise songs today. Some of us connect with formality, some of us connect with casualness. Whatever style of worship God is calling you to engage in (probably all of them!), we want to welcome you and know that you have a spiritual home in our communal worship.

In all of our worship we seek to be focused on Christ and His Word and organize our worship on what is commanded of us in Scripture!



Why Do We Do That In Worship?

In this section, we will try to briefly shed some light on why we do what we do in our times of communal worship. All of our times of worship include something along these lines. You'll notice that a theme throughout is that we do these things because we find God's call to do them in the Bible.

Call to Worship Our call to worship is a summons from God to come and worship Him. We are called and reminded to be faithful to the call we have to give all glory to God the Father through Jesus Christ. We use passages directly from or inspired by the Bible.

Singing and Music Whether hymns or praise songs or whatever you like to call them, we sing so that we can make melody to the ears of God. Music and singing are very expressive forms of communication that we have been given to express all manners of praise - through joy and through sorrow. We are told in Ephesians 5:19-20 to "be filled with the Spirit, as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." We encourage you to sing loudly and boldly and let it make a sweet sound to our God!

Prayer of Confession and Assurance of Pardon We confess our sins together that we may confess that Jesus is Lord and Savior and that we need his salvation. We take this time to unburden ourselves of the sin that weighs us down as a community and as individuals just as Jesus taught us in the Lord's Prayer. We are then assured that because of the work of Jesus Christ and through our faith in Him that all our sins are forgiven.

Sharing in the Peace of Christ This is a tangible way that we show that we are at peace with one another. We have God's peace through Jesus Christ and we extend this peace to others to show that we are united and that nothing stands between us.

Scripture Reading We read passages from both the Old and New Testaments because the whole Bible is God's Word written to us and for us and is useful so that we will know of God's love for and actions in the world, the salvation we have in Christ, and the presence of the Holy Spirit amongst us. 2 Timothy 3:16-17 tells us that, "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

Sermon We have the sermon so that the pastor can have a job. Not really. God calls us to proclaim the Word that all may believe because the Good News of Jesus Christ is *heard*. We mine the scriptures so that we may be transformed by and live our lives according to the Living Word Jesus Christ.

Offering The offering is a time to live into the commands of scripture to return what we have been blessed with to the Body of Christ - the Church. It is a time to commit our time, talent, and resources to living a Christ-centered life.

Prayers of the People We are called by God to be a people that are in regular communication with Him and we call this prayer. It is a time to adore God, thank God, and ask that God be active in particular situations in our world and in our lives. We invited you to verbally lift up a prayer to God that our whole community might join you in that prayer - the heart behind the prayer is more important than the words!



Who is That Guy?

a short biography of Pastor Seth Normington

Pastor Seth was born and raised in Spokane, Washington where the weather is nothing like the weather in Seattle. Both his mother's and father's families have a rich farming and ranching heritage but his grandparents were the ones in their families who found something else to do. He was baptized at a Presbyterian church that his mother joined the summer before he was born. He grew up playing every sport he could possibly play. He stopped going to church in fifth grade but things of faith were consistently on his mind.

In junior high and high school, Seth spent most of his time outside of school running cross country and track. In high school, he was at school by 6:30 in the morning to run and almost every day spent time after school running (he was thinner then). During his senior year his parents divorced. He was a captain on the 5th-ranked track team in the nation.

The summer before college, Seth felt called to take a deeper look at his faith but didn't know what to do about it besides reading his Bible. The day before classes started at Western Washington University, he went to the INN with a friend. There he found 600 college students praising God. He knew immediately this is where God was calling him. At the INN, he joined and led small groups, went on mission trips, wrote and performed in skits and videos, and spent a year working at the INN after graduating with a degree in human services.

Feeling called to ministry of some stripe, Seth was in youth ministry in Spokane while earning an MA in Religious Studies at Gonzaga University. He then moved to the San Francisco area to serve as youth director at the Presbyterian Church of Novato. During these years, he went to Tijuana, Mexico seven times to build houses and his heart was struck by the need for mission work and the depths of poverty in our world.

He went to Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey where he earned a Masters of Divinity degree and served people with developmental disabilities and led the educational ministry at a local church.

Pastor Seth has been the pastor at LPC since July 2010. He especially loves the opportunity to preach and teach God's Word, celebrate the sacraments, and teach and lead people to deeper discipleship in Christ.

In his off hours, Seth is the assistant coach for Linden High School boys cross country and boys and girls track and field. He also enjoys watching shows on Netflix, cooking, golfing, drinking coffee, reading several newspapers/websites each day, pretending to himself that he reads more books than he actually does, exercising, and watching baseball.

Seven Things Church Members Should Say to Guests in a Worship Service

One of the more common questions I'm asked relates to growth barriers. For example, church leaders may want to know how to move past the 150-attendance level of the past five years. Or other leaders desire to know how to break though financial giving barriers.

Those questions are tough because they often presume a brief response to be adequate. In reality, there are many theological and methodological issues at work in growth barriers. Today, I am looking at a very basic barrier: lack of friendliness to church guests.

In a previous blog post, I noted things we should not say to a guest in our worship services. In today's post I look at the positive perspective: seven things we should say to guests.

- 1. "Thank you for being here." It's just that basic. I have heard from numerous church guests who returned because they were simply told "thank you."
- 2. "Let me help you with that." If you see someone struggling with umbrellas, young children, diaper bags, purses, and other items, a gesture to hold something for them is a huge positive. Of course, this comment is appropriate for member to member as well.
- 3. "Please take my seat." I actually heard that comment twice in a church where I was speaking in the Nashville area. The first comment came from a member to a young family of five who were trying to find a place to sit together.
- 4. "Here is my email address. Please let me know if I can help in any way." Of course, this comment must be used with discretion, but it can be a hugely positive message to a guest.
- 5. "Can I show you where you need to go?" Even in smaller churches, guests will not know where to find the nursery, restrooms, and small group meeting areas. You can usually tell when a guest does not know where he or she is to go.
- 6. "Let me introduce you to _____." The return rate of guests is always higher if they meet other people. A church member may have the opportunity to introduce the guest to the pastor, other church staff, and other members of the church.
- 7. "Would you join us for lunch?" I saved this question for last for two reasons. First, the situation must obviously be appropriate before you offer the invitation. Second, I have seen this approach have the highest guest return rate of any one factor. What if your church members sought to invite different guests 6 to 12 times a year? The burden would not be great; but the impact would be huge.

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Seven Things Church Members Should Say to Guests in a Worship Service

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Let's look at one example of breaking attendance barriers by saying the right things to guests. Presume your church has two first-time guests a week. Over the course of a year, the church would have 100 first-time guests. With most of the members being genuinely guest friendly, you could see half of those guests become active members. Attendance could thus increase by as much as 50 persons every year.

Upcoming Sermon Series: Daring Faith - The Key to Miracles

Starting October 4, we will begin to look more in depth about what it means to take risks with our lives to glorify God and see God miraculously work in our lives. For eleven weeks, we will look at what it means to be daring in our faith (see the next page for specific sermon topics). As Christians in America, we have believed for too long that our faith life is where nothing has to change and nothing has to be risked. Jesus says otherwise - we are to be willing to risk our very lives for His glory. That notion immediately brings up missionaries and martyrs, but we make a big mistake by assuming that since we aren't foreign missionaries that God does not call us to be daring for Him. One aspect of our lives is finances and Daring Faith will touch on this aspect of our lives, too. See below to start praying and talking about how we are called to give to glorify God. This will be fleshed out during the series - along with other aspects of life!

"According to your faith, it will be done to you." Matthew 9:29

The one decision you or your family will make during your Daring Faith series will be your own giving commitment. How will you know what God wants you to give? As you pray about it, know that giving is about "Equal sacrifice, not equal gifts." Don't compare your commitment with anyone else's. This is between you and God. Here are some practical steps to help you to seek clarity and wisdom in your decision.

Pray this every day: "Lord, show me how to give in a way that stretches and builds my faith more than ever. I trust you for a miracle." God is more interested in you trusting him than in the amount you commit to give. As you pray daily, God will reveal the amount that you can give. If you are married, pray together with your spouse.

Don't rush your decision. Spend time alone with God each day so you can hear what He is telling you. As you seek His will, God will grow your faith and you will come closer and closer to the miracle he is preparing for you.

Decide whether you will give by reason or by revelation.

When I give based on reason, I simply look at how much I have, figure out a "reasonable" amount to give, and then commit to give that amount. This is the most common way people give to charities. It is an act of unselfishness, but it requires no faith, and no sacrifice, so there's no room for a miracle. Reason simply asks, "What can I afford to give?"

In contrast, when I give based on revelation, I pray, "Lord, what do you want to give through me?" I allow my faith to lead the way. The Bible says, "Without faith it is impossible to please God." Hebrews 11:6 (NIV). That's why God honored the people of Macedonia: "They gave not only what they could afford, they gave even more than they could afford!" 2 Corinthians 8:3. When you give more than you can afford, you are trusting God in faith to keep his promises. God has more promises in the Bible about generosity than on any other topic.

Here is one: "God loves it when we give cheerfully, so He then provides us with everything we need, and even gives us more than we need, so we can keep on being even more generous!" 2 Corinthians 9:7-8.

Hold a family conference, or set aside time alone with God to talk about your contribution. If you have children, get them involved no matter how young they are. This is an opportunity to teach them about faith and generosity.

Ask everyone to suggest creative ideas for reducing expenses, increasing income, or selling personal items in order to contribute more. Read these Bible promises and instructions together and make a list of what you learn from reading God's Word.

Proverbs 3:9-10, Proverbs 11:24-25, Luke 6:38, 1 Corinthians 16:1-2, 2 Corinthians 8:1-12, 2 Corinthians 9:6-12, Matthew 6:19-20

Remember to consider that your Daring Faith commitment includes a cash gift now, and a 36-month giving commitment. This allows you to give more than you imagined. As you develop the habit of consistent weekly giving, you will be blessed by spiritual growth.

Celebrate your commitment, and what God has revealed to you through this faith-growing process. If you are married or have a family, do this together. Let's pray:

"Father, this is a big step for us. We're asking you to stretch our faith, strengthen our faith, and deepen our faith through our commitment to be generous. We realize that everything we have comes from You, so we have made our commitment for four reasons. First, to express our gratitude for all you've provided to us in the past. Second, to show our desire for you to be first in our lives. Third, to demonstrate our faith in your promises to provide for us in the future as we honor you now. And finally, to show our love and support for our church family in making a difference for eternity. We are grateful for this opportunity to grow and trust you more. We pray that this church-wide campaign will bring you Glory! In Jesus' name, Amen!"

Focus on FISH

Our mission statement here at Linden Presbyterian Church is as follows:

We are a Christ-centered, Biblically-based community serving, engaging, and leading all to become deeper disciples of Jesus!

On a daily basis, we strive to live up to our mission through worship, fellowship, and the support programs we are blessed to run right here in our building. It is with God's grace and guidance that we are able to provide a food pantry and a clothes closet for people in need in Linden.

Linden Presbyterian Church has been a staple in the community for more than 150 years. Its members feel passionate about sharing our God-given resources with those around us. Because of dedicated teams of people and generous donations, we are able to do just that.

The F.I.S.H. food pantry (For Instant Sympathetic Help) is located behind the fireside room in the LPC basement. It is a growing ministry that provides emergency boxes of food for Linden School District residents. We have a fantastic team of 20+ people who fill many roles. Some pack food boxes, some order/pick up food from the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, and others help with deliveries and various other administrative tasks. Indirectly, people can help F.I.S.H. by simply volunteering at the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan! When you volunteer and sign in using the FISH Agency Number (P116), we earn credits to help purchase food at really exceptional prices! This allows us to keep our pantry stocked with great food.

F.I.S.H. utilizes a system of different box sizes depending on the size of the family being helped. Each box contains a variety of foods like spaghetti, macaroni, potatoes, tuna, soup, Spaghetti O's, corn, green beans, peas, tomatoes, pancake mix, syrup, cereal, baked beans, snacks and desserts, condiments, laundry detergent, dishwashing liquid, paper towels, toilet tissue, and frozen meats. The need for these items has been growing! In 2003, 85 people in 30 families were helped and in 2014, 283 people in 89 families were provided with 10.7 tons of needed care!

Deacons Provide a Ministry of Caring





Men and women over the decades have provided Christian service to those in need within the church community. This article highlights why the role of the Deacon is important to the life of the church and will provide some examples of how LPC Deacons are involved in ministering to the needs of LPC.

Deacons have the honor of serving the Lord through service to those in need, to the sick, friendless, and to those who may be in distress. They represent the heart of the church in practical ways by attending to concrete needs such as meals and visitation to the sick or homebound. Following the example laid

out by the early church in Acts 6:1-6, Deacons provide the outreach necessary to assist in making the church a caring and welcoming community. They are also privileged to build deeper relationships with members by attending to needs and providing timely support when life's challenges arise.

This past year, LPC Deacons have taken on a 'parish-list' which provides each Deacon with specific members to support through prayer and outreach as needed. We also have a 'Deacon on Duty' each month which is published in the weekly church bulletin. We currently provide communion to those who cannot attend Worship due to ill health, visitation to hospitals and nursing homes, meals to those who are undergoing difficulties from health issues or other urgent events, flowers for the families of newborns, angel statues to those who have lost a loved one





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and hands-on support at fellowship gatherings and coffee hour. Our congregation is encouraged to keep the Deacons in mind when needs arise by speaking to one of our Deacons or by calling the 'Deacon on Duty'.
